EXCERPT MINUTES OF COUNCIL MEETING

Held in the Apartments of the Geological Society, Burlington House, London, W., January 23, 1941, at 12 noon.

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Lieut. Edward Drummond Taylor was proposed and provisionally elected an Ordinary Member of the Society. The resignation of Mr. D. J. Gear was accepted. The names of certain members in arrear with their annual subscriptions were read, and that of Dr. S. W. Wooldridge was removed from the List of Members.

The Treasurer presented the audited annual accounts and balancesheet for 1940, which were approved; and he stated that precautionary measures had been taken for the safety of the Society's archives, and that he had reported to the Royal Society on the financial position of the Society.

A report was received from the Editor, who stated that the editing of the Magazine had been done from the Mineral Department of the British Museum (by T. Davies, L. Fletcher, H. A. Miers, and L. J. Spencer) for over fifty years, and that this might very well be continued.

GENERAL MEETING

Held in the Apartments of the Geological Society, Burlington House, London, W., January 23, 1941, at 2.30 p.m.

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Twenty Members and three Visitors were present.

The election of Lieut. E. D. Taylor as an Ordinary Member of the Society was confirmed.

The following exhibit was briefly explained: Spherulitic masses of zinc-blende replacing limestone from Rotherhope Fell mine, Cumberland, and baryte replacing limestone from Silverband mine, Westmorland (Dr. K. C. Dunham).

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Mr. George Howard Osborn was provisionally elected an Ordinary Member of the Society. The resignation of Mr. H. C. G. Vincent was accepted.

Reports were received from the Treasurer and the Editor. The Treasurer stated that the bulk of the stock of the *Mineralogical Magazine* had been removed for safety to the University Press at Oxford, and it was agreed that a letter of thanks be sent to Dr. John Johnson, Printer to the University, for kindly providing storage room.

It was decided to present the four numbers of the Magazine for 1941 to the Chinese University Libraries of Peiping and Chungking.

GENERAL MEETING

Held in the Apartments of the Geological Society, Burlington House, London, W., March 13, 1941, at 3.30 p.m.

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Twenty-four Members and three Visitors were present.

The election of Mr. G. H. Osborn as an Ordinary Member of the Society was confirmed.

Dr. A. T. J. Dollar exhibited a hemispherical rotational apparatus of thermo-plastic resin for use on the microscope stage.

Held in the Apartments of the Geological Society, Burlington House, London, W., June 5, 1941, at 3.30 p.m.

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Messrs. Cyril Jukes, Peter Zodac, and Reginald Stevenson Collins were provisionally elected Ordinary Members of the Society. The resignation of Dr. G. van Praagh was accepted. The death of Prof. C. G. Cullis was reported.

Reports were received from the Treasurer and the Editor.

A letter was received from the Royal Society announcing that a sum of £100 had been allocated to the Society from the Rockefeller Foundation Grant as an aid to scientific publications.

The following dates for the meetings in 1942 were approved: Thursdays, January 22, March 19, June 4, November 5.

The list of Officers and Council for 1941-2 was considered. The following were due to retire: Vice-President, Lieut.-Col. W. Campbell Smith; Ordinary Members of Council, Prof. H. L. Bowman, Dr. H. F. Harwood, Dr. W. F. P. McLintock, and Dr. J. Phemister. The following were proposed for submission to the Society: as Vice-President, Dr. W. F. P. McLintock; as Ordinary Members of Council, Mr. B. W. Anderson, Mr. C. F. Davidson, Dr. N. F. M. Henry, and Dr. W. R. Jones.

GENERAL MEETING

Held in the Apartments of the Geological Society, Burlington House, London, W., June 5, 1941, at 5 p.m.

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Twenty-five Members and five Visitors were present.

The elections of Messrs. C. Jukes, P. Zodac, and R. S. Collins as Ordinary Members of the Society were confirmed.

Dr. L. J. Spencer exhibited the third Roebling Medal which had been presented to him by the Mineralogical Society of America.

The President showed an exceptionally large polysynthetic crystal of cassiterite from Northern Nigeria.

Mr. G. H. Osborn exhibited a large mass of magnesium crystals that had been grown from sea-water by a secret process.

EXCERPT MINUTES OF COUNCIL MEETING

Held in the Apartments of the Geological Society, Burlington House, London, W., November 6, 1941, at 2 p.m.

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Dr. Norman Bell Keevil and Mr. Gordon Frederick Andrews were provisionally elected Ordinary Members of the Society. The deaths of Mr. Maurice Blumenthal and Mr. Charles W. Mathews were reported.

Reports were received from the Treasurer and the Editor.

The General Secretary presented the draft annual report of the Council for 1940–1, which was approved.

Prof. H. L. Bowman and Dr. J. V. Harrison, the auditors for 1941, were reappointed for 1942.

GENERAL (ANNIVERSARY) MEETING

Held in the Apartments of the Geological Society, Burlington House, London, W., November 6, 1941, at 3.15 p.m.

Mr. ARTHUR RUSSELL, President, in the Chair.

Thirty-four Members and four Visitors were present.

Mr. F. G. H. Blyth and Mr. C. E. N. Bromehead were appointed as scrutineers of the voting papers for the election of Officers and Council.

The elections of Dr. N. B. Keevil and Mr. G. F. Andrews were confirmed.

The General Secretary read the following:

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COUNCIL FOR 1940-1

Membership.—According to the Society's records the total membership was on October 31, 262 against 264 on October 31, 1940, but for the reasons given below this figure may be subject to correction. Six new members have been elected. On the other hand, the Society has lost by death three Ordinary Members, Prof. C. Gilbert Cullis, Charles W. Mathews, and Maurice Blumenthal; three Members have resigned, the name of one other has been removed from the List of Members on account of arrears in subscription, and one election has been declared void. On that date the Membership consisted of six Honorary Members and 256 Ordinary Members, 211 of the latter being Annual Subscribers, and 45 Life Members. Of the Ordinary Members of the Society 152 were resident in Great Britain, 50 in the Dominions and Colonies, 25 in the United States of America, and 29 in other countries. Of the 29 Ordinary Members just mentioned 16 (14 Annual Subscribers and 2 Life Members) were resident in enemy or enemy-occupied countries. All touch with them and with two Honorary Members resident in occupied countries has been lost.

Meetings.—The usual four ordinary meetings were held during the session 1940–1, at which 19 papers were read, and 6 exhibits shown, but owing to existing circumstances, the attendance was below normal. The total attendance at these meetings was 88 Members and 11 Visitors.

Publications.—In spite of considerable difficulties the regular quarterly issue of the Mineralogical Magazine has been maintained. Of the four numbers published during the year, three (172–174) contained 12 papers in 104 pages, with 3 plates, and 508 abstracts in 144 pages, as well as the Bye-Laws, List of Members, and Proceedings for 1940 in 36 pages. No. 171 contained the index to vol. 25 of the Magazine and vol. 7 of the abstracts in 120 pages.

Financial.—The accounts for the calendar year 1940, published in March last, showed an excess of Assets (exclusive of the stock of the Mineralogical Magazine, certain periodicals, and the securities allocated to the Composition Fees Account) over Liabilities of £1409. 1s. 6d. The value of the securities standing in the name of the Custodian Trustee on December 31, 1940, was, General Reserve £1212. 8s. 0d., Composition Fees Account £1083. 7s. 10d.

The outlook at the close of 1940 indicated clearly that strict economy would be necessary during 1941, and with this end in view, the Council then decided, as a precautionary measure, to limit the expenditure on the *Mineralogical Magazine* during 1941 to a maximum of £400.

The cash at Bankers, in the Post Office Savings Bank, and in hand on January 1, 1941, amounted to £157. 3s. 11d. against £321. 15s. 7d. at the beginning of 1940. A further heavy fall in the receipts from the Society's publishers for sales of the Mineralogical Magazine was anticipated, as was a considerable decline in the receipts from Annual Subscriptions.

The receipts from the publishers for sales amounted to £122. 4s. 2d. against an estimate of about £100. The corresponding figures for these receipts were £248. 10s. 4d. and £178. 11s. 10d. in 1939 and 1940 respectively. As regards Annual Subscriptions, it was estimated that of the total sum receivable for 1941, £178. 10s. 0d. would have been received by the close of the year, and about £7. 7s. 0d. as arrears. The total sum receivable from the 213 Annual Subscribers registered in the Society's books on January 1, 1941, was, for 1941, £223. 13s. 0d., and as arrears, £26. 13s. 7d., in all £250. 6s. 7d. Of this sum, however, £24. 11s. 7d. was due from 14 Annual Subscribers resident in enemy or enemy-occupied countries, and its receipt during the year could not be expected, while a further sum of £8. 8s. 0d. was due from Annual Subscribers resident in countries from which the transmission of money was expected to be difficult, if not impossible.

By October 31, £190. 19s. $10\overline{d}$, had been received in respect of 1941 subscriptions and £4. 4s. 0d. as arrears, in all £195. 3s. 10d., and the estimated figure had been exceeded by £11. 8s. 10d.

One Annual Subscriber compounded early in the year, and his Composition Fee has been invested.

In May the Society received through the Royal Society the sum of £100. 0s. 0d. from the Rockefeller Foundation Grant, in aid of its publications. This quite unexpected donation much eased the financial situation, and the Council desires to record in this report its sincere appreciation of the gift. The Council also desires to thank the Editor for his donation towards the cost of illustrations.

On October 31 the cash available for current purposes amounted to £341. 6s. 8d. Interest on Investments and other receipts will, it is anticipated, bring in about £41, while the expenditure during the remainder of the year is estimated at about £166. On this basis the cash available at the close of the year should be approximately £216.

General.—Since the beginning of 1941 the Society's Archives and the greater part of the stock of the Mineralogical Magazine have been removed from London and deposited elsewhere. These removals and other necessary air-raid precautions have entailed an expenditure of £10. 14s. 8d. Some difficulties have been experienced owing to the loss by enemy action of correspondence and remittances, but it is hoped that the arrangements that have now been made will minimize possible future losses and obviate the inconvenience caused thereby to Members resident abroad.

On the proposal of Dr. G. F. H. Smith, seconded by Dr. N. F. M. Henry, the adoption of the annual report was carried unanimously.

A vote of thanks to the Geological Society for the use of its rooms, proposed by Prof. H. H. Read, seconded by Mr. F. A. Bannister, was carried with acclamation.

The scrutineers reported that 18 ballot papers had been received and that the following list as nominated by the Council had been approved.
